Unforgettable Experience

NATIVE PLANT SPECIES ON CAMPUS

With neighbors including Washington University and Forest Park, many of the city's best cultural institutions are walkable resources for Forsyth students. Science classes take walking field trips to Forest Park to study birds and track biodiversity. Art classes walk across the street to visit the Mildred Lane Kemper Art Museum. Students frequently visit the Missouri History Museum, Saint Louis Art Museum, and Saint Louis Zoo. Physical Education hosts the annual all-school mile run at Francis Field at Washington University; Girls on the Run practices in Forest Park. Even our youngest students in Eyas and Pre-Kindergarten walk down the street

to the Elizabeth Gray Danforth Butterfly Garden.

The core of Forsyth's unique campus is comprised of six historic homes, acquired one by one throughout the school's 60-year history. All six were built in the 1920s and are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Each has been renovated to accommodate classrooms and administrative offices, plus a library, science lab, and lunchrooms. The adjoining backyards of the six houses—three each on the parallel streets of Wydown and Forsyth Boulevard—create a large, shared courtyard area converted into playgrounds, gardens, and athletic spaces (Sport Court and FieldTurf[™] field with surrounding track). Through

the years, new construction has augmented Forsyth's historic buildings with the Rand Center for Performing Arts & Athletics (and Adventure Center featuring a high ropes course, climbing wall, and high beam), Falcon's Nest (home of the Eyas Program for ages 2-3), and campus-wide infrastructure updates to support teaching and learning.

Forsyth's campus promotes independence, responsibility, curiosity, creativity, collaboration, and physical activity. More often than not, Forsyth students can be found outside—on the Main Playground, on Falcon Field, in the Big Backyard, on the Sport Court, on the Fillmore Playground, and in the Butterfly Garden. Students navigate the campus daily for dedicated specialist classes in Library, Physical Education, Science, Spanish, and the Visual & Performing Arts.

Forsyth's one-of-a-kind campus supports the school's culture of challenge and defines the educational experience as children grow from grade to grade and move from house to house.





Culture of Challenge

Forsyth is a place where "personal best" counts! The challenging and engaging curriculum is supported by our talented faculty, committed administration, and caring families. Students learn how to accept and face challenges, set goals for themselves, reflect on their experiences and accomplishments, and support their fellow students.

Developmentally appropriate challenges—memory mapping, African dance, arthropod studies, Shakespeare performances, electrical engineering, and more—encourage students to try new things. In the Adventure Center, the high ropes course and climbing wall challenge kids to stretch beyond their comfort zones and set lofty goals for themselves—literally and figuratively! The high beam is a special graduation capstone experience reserved for Grade 6 students.

Nine specialist subject areas are an exciting part of everyday life at Forsyth:

Forsyth Faculty

Through this process, Forsyth's curriculum is continually evaluated and improved.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

In addition to dedicated Division Directors for the upper (Grades 3–6) and lower grades (Eyas—Grade 2), Forsyth has a full-time Learning Specialist, a full-time Reading Support Specialist for Senior-Kindergarten through Grade 2, and a part-time Counselor.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Forsyth School is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with endowment funds that provide our faculty with opportunities to pursue professional development, including the Mark Sayers & B.J. Williams Endowment for Faculty Development (est. 2011). These opportunities enhance the classroom experience, improve the curriculum, and benefit the entire faculty-at-large.

EYAS & PRE-K / JUNIOR-K

Early Childhood Program

Forsyth's Eyas Program for ages 2–3 is designed to spark curiosity and cultivate a love for learning and school. Eyas prepares children (age 2 by August 1) for academic and social-emotional growth in the pre-primary grades and beyond.

An eyas [ahy-uh s] is a soft, downy, unfledged, nestling falcon. The name was chosen in honor of the Forsyth School mascot, Freddy Falcon.

Eyas is housed in a dedicated program space located in the heart of Forsyth's one-of-a-kind campus, with easy access to the Fillmore Playground and Butterfly Garden. Nicknamed the "Falcon's Nest," the stand-alone building was fully renovated before the program's launch in 2020. Through "purposeful play," children experience language, literacy, math, art, drama, music, science, and Spanish with highly educated teachers.

Adjacent to the Falcon's Nest is Fillmore House, home to Pre-Kindergarten (age 3 by August 1) and Junior-Kindergarten (age 4 by August 1). The Fillmore faculty is a dynamic group of passionate educators. Specialist subject areas include Library, Physical Education (beginning in Junior-Kindergarten), Science, Spanish, and Arts Experience with Forsyth's Art, Drama, and Music teachers. Forsyth's curriculum is a cohesive continuum across all grade levels, so starting during the early childhood years sets students up for success in the primary grades.

The Falcon's Nest and Fillmore House are set apart from the rest of campus, with their own playgrounds and gardens—but Forsyth's youngest students learn very early on that they are part of the larger school community. Pre-Kindergarten and Junior-Kindergarten regularly walk across campus to visit the Library and Rand Center Gymnasium, spend time with their "Big Friends" in Grades 5 and 6, and attend some assemblies, plays, and academic events.

The Eyas Program follows Forsyth's school year calendar; children are eligible for Forsyth Summer Discovery beginning at age 3.

Forsyth School follows the State of Missouri's age cut-off (August 1) as a general guideline; however, applicant placement depends upon developmental readiness.









Creative Learning

ON- & OFF-CAMPUS

African Dance & Drumming

Students in Junior-Kindergarten and above experience an African dance unit during PE classes; students in Senior-Kindergarten and above concurrently study African drumming in Music. This multidisciplinary unit includes lessons about rhythm, syncopation, and African culture.

Author Visits

Forsyth engages with nationally recognized authors (virtually and in person) to provide opportunities for students of all ages to connect with and learn from working writers who are also passionate readers! Virtual author visits during the 2021/22 school year included *New York Times* bestselling authors Sharon Draper (*Out of My Mind*, *Out of My Heart*, *Blended*) and Adam Rubin (*Dragons Love Tacos!*, *The Ice Cream Machine*).

Camping Trips

Grade 6 students experience two, three-day camping trips, and Grade 5 students take one overnight camping trip. Students in Junior-Kindergarten go "day camping" each spring.

SECOND LANGUAGE

AT HOME

Citygarden

Grade 4 takes an annual interdisciplinary field trip to Citygarden that combines art, math, and orienteering. Working in small groups, students read a map to navigate the area and answer questions about the sculptures.









Grade 2 St. Louis Neighborhood Study

Grade 2 students visit seven distinct, historical St. Louis neighborhoods as part of a year-long, cross-disciplinary unit encompassing language arts, math, social studies, and art/photography.

Grade 5 Artist-In-Residence Program

Established in 2010 in honor of Nicholas Aaron Aitken, FS '04, this annual residency provides a unique visual arts opportunity for Grade 5 students to collaborate with a visiting artist and create an exhibition for the Forsyth community.

Junior-Kindergarten Naturalists

In 2016, Science Teacher Christine Torlina created the Junior-Kindergarten Naturalist Program for the Early Childhood Science curriculum. Every year, Junior-Kindergarten students experience three seasonal walking field trips to the Kennedy Woods Savanna habitat in Forest Park, a unique ecosystem where the children connect with nature, hone their senses, strengthen their observation skills, and learn respect for all living things.

Peace March

The entire Forsyth community embarks on a Peace March to Graham Chapel at Washington University each January in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who spoke there in 1957.






Results

STANDARDIZED TEST SCORES

HEALTH & SAFETY

The health and safety of the Forsyth School community remain our highest priority. The Joan Dankner Health Office is staffed by two part-time School Nurses, one of whom is on campus during regular Forsyth school hours. Forsyth's Crisis Management Team and efforts are led by the Head of School, Division Directors, and Director of Facilities, with support from the Manager of Marketing & Communications and the School Nurses.

Crisis plans are reviewed and updated annually; school-wide drills are conducted on a seasonal basis. Technology systems include specific applications for health, safety, and emergency communications.

Forsyth maintains positive working relationships with the City of St. Louis, Clayton, and Washington University Police Departments.

FINANCIAL AID

- Tuition assistance is available for qualifying families through a grant program. Need-based awards are determined by Forsyth's Financial Aid Committee.
- Families are required to apply for financial aid online through FACTS Management Grant & Aid. All information is kept strictly confidential.
- For the 2022/23 school year, average tuition assistance was \$10,000; approximately 27% of students received need-based grants.
- Regarding divorce or separation, the Financial Aid Committee considers both parents' assets before making any award.
- Families who qualify for and receive tuition assistance receive 50% off Extended Day programs (Before Care and After Care) fees, plus a percentage reduction on League Sports fees.

The financial situation of all families varies, so the Financial Aid Committee considers each application individually. In general, families with a combined annual income of less than \$150,000 typically receive some tuition assistance.



Admission Process

Forsyth's admission process is designed to provide families with the opportunity to visit and build a relationship with Forsyth before they submit an application.
